FHHS Elections!

Forum for the History of Human Science members will need to fill at least three officer positions this fall. Members interested in standing for election should attend the business meeting in Pittsburgh, on **Saturday, November 6, from 12:00-1:30 p.m.** Following is a list of officer positions (star indicating vacancy) and their holders, past and present.

* **Chair** (two-year term, normally elected in even-numbered years): Deborah Coon shall be stepping down from her second term as Chair (1991-1992; 1997-1998) and one year as interim Chair. Previous chairs have been James Capshew (1989-90) and Mitchell Ash (1993-1994, 1995-1996). Deb served an extra year when no one contested her continued leadership at last year's business meeting. Members will need to elect someone to complete the current term; that the Chair is the only officer elected in even years helps continuity.

* **Vice-Chair** (two-year term, elected in odd-numbered years): Timothy Alborn currently holds this position, which was created at the 1993 business meeting when Chair Ash (employed abroad) requested assistance. The previous holder of the position was David Valone (1994-1995).

* **Recording Secretary** (two-year term, odd years): Hans Pols has served in this post since 1993, when he completed the term of Paul Croce (1992). The previous holder of this post was John Brooks (1989-1990, 1991, staggered term).

* **Treasurer-Corresponding Secretary** (two-year term, odd years): David Valone has served in this joint position since 1996. He was Treasurer from 1992-1995 and was preceded in this post by Ben Harris (1989-1990, 1991, staggered term). Previous Corresponding Secretaries were Richard von Mayrhauser

(1992-1993, 1994-1995), James Capshew (1991, staggered term), and Laurel Furumoto (1989-1990).

* **Representatives** (three-year terms): **Representative** One is up for election this year, as John Carson's term ends. Previous holders of this position have been Ellen Herman (1994-1996), Leila Zenderland (1991-1993), and Timothy Alborn (1989-1990).

Isis - Osiris Bibliography on the History of the Human Sciences, 1970-1998

Editors at the University of Chicago Press are considering publishing a volume of collected articles on the history of the human sciences that have been previously published in *Isis*. As a first step toward the planned volume, the editors asked the Forum to create a bibliography of all articles on the history of human sciences that have been published in *Isis* since 1970. To make a complete record, articles from the companion journal *Osiris* were included in the bibliography.

As the attached bibliography demonstrates, "human science" encompasses many different scientific disciplines. Psychology, anthropology, eugenics, and sociology are all well represented, as are the medical arts. But *Isis* has also published articles on social statistics, criminology, economics and other disciplines that have received less historical attention. If the bibliography demonstrates nothing else, it should show that there is a firm foundation for further work in the history of the human sciences.
